As you work with your child on developing their narrative writing skills, keep in mind the length of story you're aiming for.

Most children will write anywhere from 400 to 750 words during the 50 minutes allotted for the exam. That length is called 'flash fiction.'

A 300 to 750 word story can run anywhere from 1 to 3 handwritten pages.

While there is no specified number of paragraphs, it still must follow a development through the plot that has a clear introduction, body and conclusion.

NOTES: This particular study breakdown assumes that students are engaged with review and practice of concepts at least twice a week for about thirth to fifty minutes per session.

At secondary school, students will be asked to review and revisit many of the skills learnt in this programme, both for writing and for comprehension.

The best gift you can give your child is helping them appreciate the value of learning about writing. They don't have to love it or plan on becoming authors, but they should at least recognise its importance in their lives and not feel anxious when they have to write.

Narrative writing is about more than having fun with writing. It's an awesome way to develop critical and creative thinking because great stories are more than the total of their parts. Writing great stories requires students to combine their skills in a way that produces interesting and exciting ideas. This comes through practice.

Students and parents must make a commitment to implementing what is being taught. That's the only way to get better at writing.
